


**MUSEUM HOURS:**

**DAILY ONE-HOUR GUIDED TOURS**

- ▶ Stand on top of the launch duct
- ▶ Descend 35 feet into the underground missile complex
- ▶ Visit the launch control center
- ▶ Experience a simulated launch of the missile  
Handicapped accessible. Regular admission fees apply.

**BEYOND THE BLASTDOOR 90 MINUTE TOURS**

- ▶ See areas normally closed to the public
- ▶ Offered on the first and third Saturday at 9:30 a.m.
- ▶ See where the crews ate and slept
- ▶ Descend 100+ feet underground and enter the launch duct
- ▶ Stand directly beneath an actual Titan II missile  
Not handicapped accessible. Must be 8 years old and older to go on this tour. Reservations required. Additional fees apply.

**CREW TOURS, TUESDAYS 2P.M.**

- ▶ Tour the missile site with former Titan II Missile Combat Crew Members as your tour guides
- ▶ Hear their stories and learn from their first hand experiences  
Handicapped accessible. Regular admission fees apply. Reservations required.

**TITAN TOP-TO-BOTTOM TOURS**

- ▶ Explore eight levels of the silo, more than 140 feet underground  
Must be at least 16 years of age, able to climb a 15-foot ladder and fit through holes 2 feet in diameter. Not handicapped accessible. Special fees apply. Reservations required.

**MOONLIGHT MADNESS TOURS**

- ▶ Visit the museum at night on selected Saturdays in the summer. Special activities for the kids include launching seltzer rockets, sampling space food and taking the astronaut test. Fun for the entire family. Admission \$7 for adults and free for children 12 and under.



### A HISTORY OF KEEPING THE PEACE

“Duck and Cover!” Bomb Shelters, the Berlin Wall, weekly tests of the Emergency Broadcast System and the piercing sounds of air raid sirens. These are the hallmarks of the “Cold War” era.

The Titan Missile Museum showcases the dramatic vestiges of the Cold War between the U.S. and the former Soviet Union and provides a vivid education about the history of nuclear conflict—a history of keeping the peace.



The Titan II Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) was the first liquid propellant missile that could be launched from underground. Equipped with a nine-megaton thermonuclear warhead, the Titan II was capable of reaching its target—more than half a world away—in less than thirty minutes.

The preserved Titan II missile site, officially known as complex 571-7, was completed and turned over to the U.S. Air Force in 1963. Until 1987, when the last Titan II was deactivated, 54 Titan II missile complexes across the United States stood “on alert” 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

### COLD WAR SECRETS REVEALED

What was once one of America’s most top secret places is now a National Historic Landmark. Nowhere else in the world can visitors get this close to an ICBM in its operational environment. This one-of-a-kind museum gives visitors a rare look at the technology used by the U.S. to deter nuclear war.



Knowledgeable docents, some of whom are former Titan II personnel, bring the history of the missile site alive. During a one-hour guided tour, visitors will:

- Experience a simulated missile launch in the underground launch control center.
- View the massive 103-foot tall Titan II missile in its launch duct.
- See the 8-foot thick silo walls, the 3-ton blast doors and much more.

### EXHIBITS & EDUCATION

The Count Ferdinand von Galen Education and Research Center at the Titan Missile Museum houses exhibits on Titan II and Cold War history, the Kid Command Center, and the largest archival collection in the world of Titan II documents, photographs and memorabilia.

The Museum has a strong commitment to education. School/Youth Group Tours are FREE, and many other in-depth tours are available to the public.
